### **Key Knowledge:**

#### What is Christianity?

Christianity is one of the five main world religions and is the largest in its following with 2.4 billion followers. It began after the death of Jesus. Jesus was born a Jew and Christianity originally developed as part of Judaism. Christians are expected to go to Church, although worship can take place elsewhere too. The worship involves praising God or asking for his help and guidance through prayer, hymns or chants. The Bible is read and there may be a sermon when worshipping at Church. The main act of church worship is held on a Sunday.

#### What is the Church of England?

The Church of England is the leading church in England. As part of the Anglican Communion, which is a worldwide family of churches in more than 160 different countries, the Church of England is understood to be a combination of Catholic and reformed Christian beliefs, practiced across the country. Like most Christian denominations, the Church of England believe that the Bible contains the core of all Christian faith and thought. Church of England followers believe that God is Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and is at the heart of their faith
